

### MUNFORD TRAIL HISTORY

Welcome to the Munford Trail. This trail will lead you along the shoreline of John H. Kerr Reservoir, and through natural areas that only 200 years ago was Robert Munford's home. Robert Munford was once a recognized citizen of early Mecklenburg County (VA). If you take the Cemetery Loop you will see the cemetery where he is buried.

Humans have inhabited this area for thousands of years. Try to find the clues of the changes that have taken place. Think about what the area might have looked like when red wolves and the Occaneechi Native Americans called this area home. Consider what it would have been like to live here when this area was a tobacco plantation or when it was the background to the Revolutionary war.

#### NOTICE

- ⇒ Camping is prohibited on this trail
- ⇒ Pack in and pack out all of your trash
- ⇒ There are some places along the trail that may be submerged during periods of high water
- $\Rightarrow$  Sturdy walking shoes are recommended
- ⇒ This trail is more than 7 miles long including the cemetery loop and is one-way, so plan ahead and prepare regarding time allotted, distance walked, and parking

- ⇒ This is a multi-use trail available to bikers, hikers, and horseback riders, so please yield properly.
